

First Sunday of Advent, November 30, 2025

From the Desk of the Pastor:

Ever since the attack on the World Trade center in New York on Sept 11, 2001, there have been nonstop warnings to be alert to possible terrorist attacks. In U. S. airports, repeated public announcements from Homeland Security advise whether the level of alert is yellow, orange or red. People are asked to be vigilant about their luggage, lest someone add to our bags something that contains a bomb. -- Who of us is smarter than Jesus? Today's second and third readings want us to move to red alert. Paul wants the Romans to wake up, and Jesus warns us to stay awake.

<u>In the first reading (Is 2:1-5)</u>, Isaiah describes his prophetic vision of all nations making a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, affirming their Faith in the one true God. <u>Today's Responsorial Psalm</u> (Ps 122), is one of the Songs of Assent, the joyous hymns originally sung as pilgrims journeyed to the Temple in Jerusalem. They prepare us for our yearly pilgrimage. <u>In the second reading (Rom 13:11-14)</u>, Paul exhorts the Roman Christian community to get ready to meet Jesus in his *Second Coming* by discharging their duties properly and by freeing themselves from their former pagan life style of jealousy and rivalry. We, too, are challenged to make spiritual preparations for Christ's birth in our lives.

<u>In today's Gospel (Mt 24:37-44)</u>, Jesus warns us of the urgency of vigilant preparation for his coming on our part that we may meet him as our Judge both at the end of our lives on earth and on the day of the Last Judgment when he comes in his glory. Jesus reminds us that the unrepentant, ill-prepared evil people were destroyed by the flood in the time of Noah and that a thief will be able to break in and plunder the precious belongings of an ill-prepared householder. Using additional examples later, Jesus repeats his warning for us to be vigilant and well-prepared all the time, doing the will of God by loving others.

<u>Life message</u>: We need to be alert and watchful while spiritually preparing for Christmas by offering our daily work to God for His glory, by practicing more self-control in resisting our evil habits and inclinations, by seeking reconciliation daily with God, our families, and our neighbors, and by asking God's pardon and forgiveness as we extend our unconditional forgiveness to those who have hurt us. Let us begin each day by praying for the strength and power of the Holy Spirit to prepare ourselves for Jesus' rebirth in our hearts and lives.

Saint Elizabeth of Hungary (1207-1231) chose to live her life as a witness for Christ by serving thousands of those who were poor, hungry, and sick.



She was a princess, the daughter of the King of Hungary. At the age of six, her mother was murdered for political reasons, and her prayers for peace were a source of comfort to her. As she grew, her prayer life continued.

When she was 14, she married Ludwig IV, a German nobleman of Thuringia. Ludwig loved Elizabeth and respected and supported her desire to live a life of simplicity and penance and helping the less fortunate. On a daily basis, she brought bread to hundreds of the hungry poor. She cared for the victims of disease and floods.

Ludwig died in 1227. In 1228, Elizabeth joined the Third Order of St. Francis and founded a hospital in his honor, where she personally tended to the sick. Elizabeth died when she was 24 years old in 1231.

Pope Gregory IX canonized her on May 27, 1235, four years later. St. Elizabeth of Hungary is the patron saint of bakers, Catholic Charities, and the Secular Franciscan Order. Her feast day is November 17.


