

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, August 10, 2025

From the Desk of the Pastor:

Once Francis of Assisi (1182-1226) was hoeing his garden when one of his brothers in Christ asked him, "Suppose you knew for certain that you were going to die and meet your Maker at the stroke of midnight tomorrow? How would you spend your time between now and then?" "Come what may, Francis answered, "I would finish hoeing my garden." In a sense, the Scripture readings for today invite each of us to become engaged in a similar reflection. What would you do if you knew that this day would be your last? What would you not do? How would you prepare to meet God? Where would you go? With whom would you spend your remaining hours?

The first reading cites the Faith-filled preparedness of the ancient Hebrew slaves in Egypt before their mass exodus to the Promised Land. Their trusting Faith in their God's promises gave them hope. We are told how their Faith and Hope resulted in their liberation. With expectant Hope, the Hebrews sacrificed the first Passover lamb and ate the first ritual meal, as prescribed by their God through Moses. They awaited their imminent release and were prepared for it. Today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 33) invites us to express our own confidence in God and to declare our trust in His Providence. In the Second Reading, taken from the last chapter of the letter to the Hebrews, the author defines Faith as "the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). He tries to bolster the Faith of the Jewish Christians, (the Hebrews), by appealing to the example of their ancestors, starting with Abraham, and reviewing the things they accomplished by Faith.

<u>In the Gospel</u>, Jesus challenges his disciples to trust the Father's promise to give them eternal happiness in His kingdom. But they are to be prepared at all times, because the Son of Man will come at an unexpected hour, either at the moment of their death or at the end of the world, whichever is comes first. Using the master-thief parable, Jesus warns us to be on our guard so that the thief (the devil), may not steal our treasure of Divine grace or our relationship with God by his temptations. Using the master-servant parable, Jesus reminds us always to do the will of God by obeying Jesus' commandment of love and offering humble and sacrificial service to others.

Life message: We always need to be prepared to meet Our Lord as our judge: Let us always remember the words of the Book of Revelation: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will enter his house and dine with him and he with me" (3:20). Since no one is sure about the time and circumstances of one's death, we must be ever prepared to face Jesus our Lord and Savior as our Judge at the moment of our death to give an account of our lives. Jesus wants to see that we have kept our personal relationship with him by growing in holiness. Such a growth is assisted by daily talking to him and listening to him in Bible reading; by asking for the guidance of the Holy Spirit every day; by recharging our spiritual batteries through offering our lives on the altar and getting spiritual nourishment in Holy Communion during the Holy Mass; by getting reconciled with God every day, asking for His pardon and forgiveness with a repentant heart, and seeking His forgiveness through the Sacrament of Reconciliation for our sins; and by obeying Jesus' commandment of love by serving all the people around us, sacrificially sharing our blessings with them, and seeing the face of Jesus in everyone.


Safe Environment

St. Maximilian Kolbe (1894-1941)

Raymund Kolbe was born in Poland. As a child he was drawn to religious life, and at the age of 12, a conversion experience left him with a deep devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and her mission to bring all souls to Jesus. In 1907 he entered religious life in the Conventual Franciscan seminary where his name was changed to Maximilian, and he professed his final vows in 1914. He later studied for the priesthood and was ordained in 1918. In 1917, while he was still in the seminary, he founded the movement "Knights of the Immaculate" to save as many souls as possible under the patronage of the Blessed Virgin Mary. He and 800 friars evangelized by publishing free literature for the people. In the beginning of WWII, he provided sanctuary to 3000 Polish refugees; of these, 2000 were Jews. In a radio broadcast and a printed edition of his monthly magazine, Fr. Kolbe denounced the crimes of

the Nazis. On February 17,1941, the Gestapo arrested him. Numbered prisoner 16670, he went to the Auschwitz concentration camp, where he endured frequent brutal beatings. In July 1941, ten men were chosen to die by starvation because a prisoner had escaped. Fr. Kolbe was not chosen, but he volunteered to take the place of a man with a family. After two weeks, Fr. Kolbe and a few others were still alive. They were executed by lethal injection. The last one to be injected was Fr. Kolbe who calmly lifted his arm for the injection. His remains were cremated on August 15,1941. Fr. Kolbe was canonized as a Martyr by Pope John Paul II in 1981.
